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
## YOUTH PREVENTION RESOURCE CENTER

We invest significant resources to be responsive to the needs of our youth and support healthy decision-making, supporting both those who work with youth and youth themselves.

The Youth Prevention Resource Center offers on-site and virtual training, webinars, tip sheets, and resources on various topics and issues facing youth today.










## YOUTH ARE OUR PARTNERS

We consider youth to be experts on their peers and, as such, an integral part of the work we do. The YPRC facilitates a group of young people known as our Youth Advisory Board (YAB). YAB members are selected through an application process and play an active role in developing resources and identifying solutions to the issues facing their peers. They undergo training and have opportunities to speak with and to various stakeholders that impact our shared work.

This year, YAB members served as subject matter experts on issues impacting young people during IL Alliance calls, created social media campaigns, and guided the work the YPRC did throughout the year.


## YOUTH LEADERSHIP STORIES
